The Desplaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District is an independent municipality, established in 1927 by the “Mosquito Abatement Districts Act” which provided for the organization of tax-supported mosquito abatement districts within Illinois. The District operates under Chapter 70, Act 1005, Sections 0.01-13a, of the Illinois Compiled Statutes. Control operations are conducted on a calendar year basis with separate summary report issued. Financial operations are conducted on a May 1 - April 30 fiscal year with review and report issued by independent auditor.

Mosquito development is governed directly by prevailing weather conditions, and by no means can be considered predictable. Control operations must and do vary on a daily basis to meet the changing requirements of any particular mosquito season. Expenditures are directly related to operational intensity, and vary accordingly. Annual budgetary procedures are established in anticipation of a “heavy” mosquito season. Thus if climatic conditions are conducive to this extent, finances are available to complete necessary control measures. However, if climatic conditions create a “lighter” mosquito population, expenditures are lower with any surplus funds re-appropriated to the next fiscal period and subsequent tax levy requirement.

The 2023-24 fiscal year period encompassed the 2023 mosquito season. COVID-19 protocol established in prior seasons was carried over into the current season. Modified operations were maintained with reduced staff and expanded use of growth regular larval control products. Essential operations focusing on the monitoring and control of vector mosquitoes involved in West Nile Virus transmission to humans remained unchanged. Overall expenditures fell below appropriations with comments on specific items are summarized below:

Personal Services

Staff salaries and field wages fell below appropriation due to a the level of operations experienced during 2023. Health insurance related expenses were below normal with restructured coverage effective 1/1/15. Workers compensation insurance classification categories remained in place to reflect below anticipated expense. Unemployment insurance contribution rates continued to increase during fiscal period with actual expenses below appropriated levels.

Contractual Services

Maintenance categories fell near or below appropriated levels with expenses remaining routine and anticipated during the fiscal period. Insurance expenses have stabilized due to current market conditions. Finally, utilities and related services fell near or below appropriated levels.

Commodities

Expenses in general fell below appropriations for the fiscal period. Insecticide totals reflected demands of season experienced.

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund & Social Security Funds

Both funds are rate related to payroll totals. The IMRF contribution rate continued to decrease with net favorable deviation in this category. District contributions to social security/medicare fell below appropriated levels due to actual payroll totals experienced.

Capital Improvement, Repair or Replacement Fund

General expenses overall fell below appropriated levels.

The 2023-24 fiscal period ended overall with net favorable cash fund balances. This will create a carry-over fund re-appropriation into the 2024-25 fiscal period and be applied to the 2024 tax year levy requirement.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Opinions

We have audited accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District, as of and for the year ended April 30, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District as of April 30, 2024 and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and the required supplementary information listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements and the financial information listed as schedules and supplemental data in the accompanying table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements, the schedules, and supplemental data are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual financial report. The other information comprises the introductory and statistical sections but does not include the basic financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with the audit of the basic financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the basic financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

April 30, 2024

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District, Cook County, Illinois (the District) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, as applied to government units (hereinafter referred to as generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP)). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below

a. Reporting Entity

The District is a municipal corporation governed by an appointed five-member board. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, these financial statements present the District (the primary government). There are no component units included in the District's reporting entity.

The District was incorporated in November 1927. The District operates under a Trustee form of government and provides mosquito control services.

b. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the District are organized and operated on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purpose and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with finance related legal and contractual provisions. The minimum number of funds are maintained consistent with legal and managerial requirements.

Funds are classified into the following category: governmental.

Governmental funds are used to account for all of the District's general activities, including the collection and disbursement of earmarked monies (special revenue funds), and the acquisition or construction of general capital assets (capital projects funds). The general fund is used to account for all activities of the general government not accounted for in some other fund.

c. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the activities of the District.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which direct expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues, if any, include (1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function and (2) grants and shared revenues that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a given function. Taxes and other items are not properly included among program revenues but are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds. Major governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the District not accounted for in other funds.

The Capital Improvements, Repair, or Replacement Fund accounts for the District's capital assets acquisitions.

d. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when susceptible to accrual (i.e., when they become both measurable and available). "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period (60 days) or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. The District recognizes property taxes when they become both measurable and available in the year intended to finance.

d. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation (Cont.)

Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred. Those revenues susceptible to accrual are property taxes and interest revenue.

The District reports unearned/deferred revenue on its financial statements. Unearned/deferred revenues arise when a potential revenue does not meet both the measurable and available or earned criteria for recognition in the current period. Unearned/deferred revenues also arise when resources are received by the District before it has a legal claim to them, as when grant monies are received prior to the incurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when both revenue recognition criteria are met or when the District has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for unearned/deferred revenue is removed from the financial statements and revenue is recognized.

e. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment are reported in the applicable governmental columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets greater than \$3,000 with an estimated useful life in excess of one year.

Such assets are recorded at historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value or service capacity of the asset or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Property, plant, and equipment is depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

f. Prepaid Items/Expenses

Payments made to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond the date of this report are recorded as prepaid items/expenses, if any.

g. Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources.

This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The government has only one type of item, which arises only under a modified accrual basis of accounting that qualifies for reporting in this category. Accordingly, the item, unavailable revenue, is reported only in the governmental funds balance sheet. The governmental funds report unavailable revenues from one source: property taxes. These amounts are deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period that the amounts become available.

h. Compensated Absences

Vested or accumulated vacation leave, if material, are reported as an expenditure and a fund liability of the governmental fund that will pay it once retirement or separation has occurred. Vested or accumulated vacation leave of governmental activities are recorded as an expense and liability of those funds as the benefits accrue to employees. Sick leave does not vest.

i. Short-Term Interfund Receivables/Payables

During the course of operations, numerous transactions occur between individual funds for goods provided or services rendered. These receivables and payables are classified as “due from other funds” or “due to other funds” on the balance sheet.

j. Cash and Investments

Investments with a maturity of less than one year, at the time of purchase, if any, are stated at cost, which approximates fair value. Nonnegotiable certificates of deposit are stated at cost.

k. Interfund Transactions

Transactions for interfund services provided and used are accounted for as revenues, expenditures, or expenses. Transactions that constitute reimbursements to a fund for expenditures initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund, are recorded as expenditures in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures in the fund that is reimbursed.

All other interfund transactions, except interfund services transactions and reimbursements, are reported as transfers.

l. Net Position/Fund Balances

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report nonspendable fund balance for amounts that are either not in spendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Restrictions of fund balance are reported for amounts constrained by legal restrictions from outside parties for use for a specific purpose, or externally imposed by outside entities. None of the restricted fund balance result from enabling legislation adopted by the District. Committed fund balance is constrained by formal actions of the District's Board of Trustees, which is considered the District's highest level of decision-making authority. Formal actions include resolutions and ordinances approved by the Board. Assigned fund balance represents amounts constrained by the District's intent to use them for a specific purpose. The authority to assign fund balance has been delegated to the Manager through the approved fund balance policy of the District. Any residual fund balance in the General Fund is reported as unassigned.

It is the District's philosophy to support long-term financial strategies, where fiscal sustainability is its first priority, while also building funds for future growth. It is essential to maintain adequate levels of fund balance to mitigate current and future risks (e.g., revenue shortfalls and unanticipated expenditures) and to ensure stable tax rates. Fund balance levels are also a crucial consideration in long-term financial planning.

l. Net Position/Fund Balances (Cont.)

The District's flow of funds assumption prescribes that the funds with the highest level of constraint are expended first. If restricted or unrestricted funds are available for spending, the restricted funds are spent first. Additionally, if different levels of unrestricted funds are available for spending, the District considers committed funds to be expended first followed by assigned and then unassigned funds.

The restricted fund balance in the IMRF Fund, Social Security Fund, and Audit Fund will be adjusted annually with the adoption of the annual budget and is calculated at a minimum of three months (25%) of expenditures not including capital, debt service and transfers.

Fund balance in the Capital Improvements, Repair, or Replacement Fund will be considered restricted, committed, or assigned depending on the intended source/use of the funds.

m. Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

The District's investment policy authorizes the District to invest in all investments allowed by Illinois Compiled Statutes (ILCS). These include deposits/investments in insured commercial banks, savings and loan institutions, obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies, insured credit union shares, money market mutual funds with portfolios of securities issued or guaranteed by the United States or agreements to repurchase these same obligations, repurchase agreements, short-term commercial paper rated within the three highest classifications by at least two standard rating services, Illinois Funds (created by the Illinois State Legislature under the control of the State Comptroller that maintains a \$1 per share value which is equal to the participants fair value), and the Illinois Metropolitan Investment Fund (IMET), a not-for-profit investment trust formed pursuant to the Illinois Municipal Code and managed by a Board of Trustees elected from the participating members. IMET is not registered with the SEC as an investment company. Investments in IMET are valued at IMET's share price, the price for which the investment could be sold. The District's investment policy does limit its deposits to financial institutions that are members of the FDIC system and are capable of posting collateral for amounts in excess of FDIC insurance.

It is the policy of the District to invest its funds in a manner which will provide the highest investment return with the maximum security while meeting the daily cash flow demands of the District and conforming to all state and local statutes governing the investment of public funds, using the "prudent person" standard for managing the overall portfolio. The primary objectives of the policy are, in order of priority, safety of principal, minimize credit risk, minimize interest rate risk, liquidity, and rate of return.

Deposits with Financial Institutions

Custodial credit risk for deposits with financial institutions is the risk that in the event of bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District's investment policy requires pledging of collateral for all amounts in excess of FDIC limits, at an amount not less than 110% of the fair market value of the funds secured, with the collateral held by an independent third-party depository in the name of the District.

Currently all of the cash and investments on the statement of net assets in the accompanying financial statements as of April 30, 2024 are considered deposits with financial institutions

3. RECEIVABLES - TAXES

Property taxes for 2023 attach as an enforceable lien on January 1, 2023 on property values assessed as of the same date. Taxes are levied by December 31 of the subsequent fiscal year (by passage of a Tax Levy Ordinance). Tax bills are prepared by the County and issued on or about February 1, 2024 and July 1, 2024 and are payable in two installments, on or about March 1, 2024 (55%) and

September 1, 2024 (45%). The County collects such taxes and remits them periodically. The allowance for uncollectible taxes has been stated at 2% of the tax levy to reflect actual collection experience. Since the 2023 levy was intended to finance the 2025 fiscal year, the levy has been reported as deferred revenue.

The 2024 tax levy, which attached as an enforceable lien on property as of January 1, 2024, has not been recorded as a receivable as of April 30, 2024 as the tax has not yet been levied by the District and will not be levied until December 2024 and, therefore, the levy is not measurable at April 30, 2024.

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5. RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; illnesses of employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by commercial insurance purchased from independent third parties. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage for the past three fiscal years.

6. OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

The District does not provide any postemployment benefits for its retired employees, and as such no current employees will be receiving them upon retirement.

7. EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The District participates in the statewide Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund, an agent multiple-employer public employee pension plan which covers substantially all of the qualified District employees.

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund

The District's defined benefit pension plan, Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), provides retirement, disability, annual cost of living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. IMRF is an agent multiple-employer pension plan that acts as a common investment and administrative agent for local governments and school districts in Illinois. The Illinois Pension Code establishes the benefit provisions of the plan that can only be amended by the Illinois General Assembly. IMRF issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the plan as a whole but not by individual employer. That report may be obtained online at www.imrf.org.

Plan Administration

All employees hired in positions that meet or exceed the prescribed annual hourly standard must be enrolled in IMRF as participating members.

The Plan is accounted for on the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Employer and employee contributions are recognized when earned in the year that the contributions are required, benefits and refunds are recognized as an expense and liability when due and payable.

Benefits Provided

IMRF provides two tiers of pension benefits. Employees hired prior to January 1, 2011, are eligible for Tier 1 benefits. For Tier 1 employees, pension benefits vest after eight years of service. Participating members who retire at age 55 (reduced benefits) or after age 60 (full benefits) with eight years of credited service are entitled to an annual retirement benefit, payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 1 - 2/3% of their final rate of earnings, for each year of credited service up to 15 years, and 2% for each year thereafter.

Employees hired on or after January 1, 2011, are eligible for Tier 2 benefits. For Tier 2 employees, pension benefits vest after ten years of service. Participating members who retire at age 62 (reduced benefits) or after age 67 (full benefits) with ten years of credited service are entitled to an annual retirement benefit, payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 1 - 2/3% of their final rate of earnings, for each year of credited service up to 15 years, and 2% for each year thereafter. IMRF also provides death and disability benefits. These benefit provisions and other requirements are established by state statute.

Contributions

Participating members are required to contribute 4.5% of their annual covered salary to IMRF. The District is required to contribute the remaining amount necessary to fund IMRF as specified by statute.

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.25%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate, and that the District contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between actuarial determined contribution rates and the member rate. Based upon those assumptions, the fiduciary net position was projected not to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.25% was blended with the index rate of 1.84% for tax-exempt general obligation municipal bonds rated AA or better at December 31, 2023, to arrive at a discount rate of 7.25% used to determine the total pension liability.

Expenditures may not legally exceed budgeted appropriations at the fund level. During the year, no supplementary appropriations were necessary.

Total expenditures for the year were not in excess of budgeted expenditures.
